Wise and loving God, you have created, and are still creating, a world rich with difference and diversity. You have created all people in your image, each expressing their being and living their life in valid, special relationship with you. **For all this, we give you praise.**

For historical acts of injustice and oppression perpetuated against Aboriginal communities, Black, and various Asian communities in this abundant land of the First Nations: Forgive us, merciful God.

For the times we have failed to recognize racism in ourselves, in our church, in our society, and the times we have failed to take action, **Forgive us, long-suffering God.**

For complicity in systems of privilege and power over those whose skin colour, culture, or creed differ from those of the majority, even today: Forgive us, compassionate God.

Grant us courage never to let a racist joke pass in our hearing, commitment to insist on equal treatment of all persons and groups including ourselves if oppressed even at the risk of being unpopular or misunderstood: **We beseech you, God of justice.**

Grant us patience in enduring periods of non-action, persistence in resisting the evil of radical oppression, and faithfulness in working toward racial justice among your people, in the church, and in the world: **We beseech you, God of hope.**

And grant us humility and wisdom to discern when it is that your Spirit must come to accomplish that which human beings and groups cannot. We pray in the name of Jesus, himself the bread of justice and the cup of solidarity. **Amen.**

Collective Prayers

Jesus, we ask for Your healing and comforting hand to hold all of those who have been affected by these tragic deaths. Be with [Ahmaud Arbery, Breonna Taylor, George Floyd's and others] family during this time of shock, grief, and mourning. Bear them up as they lay to rest their loved ones. Walk with them through their times of anger and their sorrow during this sudden unjust agony of all their tomorrows.

God, we are at a loss for words on how to pray for the persons who committed these unimaginable acts. Only You can completely understand their state of mind and heart. Release Your power of holiness, repentance, and righteousness within their souls. Your love is greater. May their souls walk in Your redeeming work of justice and conviction so that peace and restitution prevails.

O God, we thank You for Your Church, founded upon Your Word, that challenges us to do more than sing and pray, but go out and work as though the very answer to our prayers depended on us. Help us to realize that we are created to shine like the stars and live on through all eternity. Keep us, we pray, in perfect peace, help us to walk together, pray together, sing together, and live together until that day when all God's children will rejoice in one common band of humanity in the kingdom of our Lord and of our God, we pray, in Jesus name...Amen (Martin Luther King Jr.).

Jesus, one of your final prayers was for unity among your people (John 17:21). I pray for the coming together of people of all colors, socioeconomic, and religious backgrounds within the church to seek you in united prayers of repentance to receive forgiveness for the sins of racism and empowerment to move toward reconciliation and conciliation. Enable church leaders to pave the way in pursuing racial healing with faith and love. Strengthen congregations leading multi-racial Bible study groups to be catalysts of change. Empower church leaders as they minister your Word with boldness, leading to healing in communities across this nation. May the church turn to God's Word and let it speak to the issues of justice and healing for which our nation cries out. "Let us be concerned for one another, to help one another to show love and to do good (Heb. 10:24)."

Jesus be Banner of Peace over the "Peace Walks" in our communities. Guide us on the way of love and grace. Lead us on the way of honest dialogue and on the way of reconciliation between the people, city officials, church leaders, government officials, and social justice workers in our city. Help us, Holy Spirit, as we walk on the way of disarmament and justice and on the way of freedom and life for all (Howard Thurman).

Lord, I pray for justice and righteousness on earth that reflects the original design of heaven. May the inherent dignity and value of every person be recognized as they are empowered to maximize their God-given potential through righteous systems of order and justice. I pray against the strongholds of darkness that build corrupt systems of injustice. May any dark, spiritual, and ideological system be dismantled, as we rebuild new ways of thinking, being, and doing to honor and serve all people equally. Grant wisdom to those building social justice reforms in alignment with biblical truths. In recognizing the sinful nature of every person, we pray for the establishment of justice systemically rooted in the knowledge of Christ's saving grace, leading to societal transformation from the individual to the

collective whole by the power of God. "The Lord is your mighty defender, perfect and just in all his ways; Your God is faithful and true; he does what is right and fair (Deut. 32:4)."

God, I pray you would heal the spiritual, emotional, and physical wounds many carry due to the color of their skin. Remove the spirit of division at the root of racism and replace it with your love, unity, and peace. Bring healing to those who are traumatized by racism personally or indirectly. Heal souls from the sin of racism which separate them from you and others. Bring healing to families and communities, as well as social and civil institutions. Bring racial unity through reforms in policy changes. Bring healing and righteousness to brokenness in educational, health care, employment, criminal justice, and housing systems. I pray for the wounds of trauma to be healed through the power of Scripture. "I will make you well again; I will heal your wounds, though your enemies say, 'Zion is an outcast; no one cares about her.' I, the Lord, have spoken (Jer. 30:17)."

Lord, I ask you to give empathy and understanding to those seeking education on racism to become agents of righteous change. Grant your church humility to have honest conversations about race, building bridges with those of different ethnic backgrounds toward a unified message of justice pointing to the gospel. Enable all forms of government, community, and sectors of society to engage in loving discourse that honors all people in bringing social justice. May conversations lead to Spirit-led actions that transform communities and shift our national discourse. "My dear friends, you should be quick to listen and slow to speak or to get angry (Jam. 1:19)."

Lord, search my heart to reveal any offensive way in me that has contributed to the sin of racism. Produce in me and others across this nation a godly sorrow that leads to true repentance. Through forgiveness and reconciliation, bring healing from racism to communities that have been harmed by the silence, ignorance, and inaction that perpetuate racism. Redeem, restore, and renew through godly reconciliation. May believers in Christ live in greater love and unity as a result of repentance and forgiveness. "If [my people] pray to me and repent and turn away from the evil they have been doing, then I will hear them in heaven, forgive their sins, and make their land prosperous again (2 Chron. 7:14)."

God, awaken us to Your wisdom and teaching of the spiritual warfare that is happening in our cities. Let us see clearly these operations and respond, by Your Spirit, to infiltrate the demonic forces...the principalities, powers, and authorities...that sit in those high places. Thank You for equipping us with spiritual weaponry to stand firm and push back against the enemy's assaults, his campaign of lies, distortions, oppressive behaviors, distractions, and accusations over us and our city. Keep each of us steady, clear-minded, braced, ready, walking wisely and living in victory. Fix our eyes upon You in these days.

Lord, you give us the unwavering call to do righteous and holy justice. You tell us to defend the cause of the fatherless and the widow. To provide for the hungry, thirsty, and naked. To love our enemy. May Your Spirit fill us with hope. Remind us that we are good enough for You, so that in all things, we will follow Your will, and take up the call to love mercy and to walk humbly with You (Erica VanEssendelft).

WHAT CAN WE DO?

When Christians—whether White, Non-Black, or Black individuals who feel culturally disconnected seek to become better allies and advocates, the path forward invites more than words; it calls for prayerful reflection and intentional action. Rooted in African American history and spirituality as well as the life of Jesus, we are drawn into a deeper union with God, standing with the marginalized, recognizing the realities of systemic injustice, and allowing Christ's love and justice to shape our hearts. Here are practical steps to guide us as we live out this transformation in our daily lives:

- 1. Give the Black community needed space to Lament. "We are living in a country that doesn't love us, and every day of our lives is emotionally taxing. We carry ancestral trauma in our bodies and the daily emotional tax of continually looking over our shoulder for anti-Black aggressions (by Cory Leak)."
- 2. Make time to intentionally dig up your family's history. Take a DNA test for ethnicity and genealogy mapping like ancestry.com. Follow the breadcrumbs of your own family history. "Learning your history is forced reckoning, asking you to consider whose stories you carry with you and which ones you want to carry forward (Jaya Saxena)."
- 3. Pay a form of reparations to Black churches and/or nonprofits from your organization's budget.
- 4. Teach anti-racism (anti-caste systems) courses in your new members' classes or sermons (ex. Sermon on the Mount, Elephant in the Room, Table Talks, Courageous Conversations, etc.).
- 5. Collaborate with other churches, youth groups, etc., and have table fellowship with food to create space for conversations (ex. share what justice means)
- 6. Listen to the voices of non-white authors, speakers, teachers, theologians, singers, poets, artists, and creatives.
- 7. On family holidays when you know they are going to say something racist, confront your racist siblings and parents.
- 8. Stand in the streets with Black people and put your bodies on the line to be hit with tear gas too.
- **9.** Be pastored or mentored by someone who is not white. Essentially sit under mindfully wise Black leadership and be mentored not for symbolism.
- 10. When you have the urge to want to move back to the "mid-west" or the "suburbs" because you are tired of the "trauma you're experiencing" ...fight the urge and stay put. Lean in with love and be in healing-centered engagement circles.
- 11. Sign petitions, write letters, march, and protest to your local Mayor, Police Chief, and Representatives asking them for higher accountability for those officers who have enacted unjust violence, for transparency on the training being given to their police officers, for redirecting funds from PD budgets to education, healthcare, housing, etc.
- 12. Don't be a Nicodemus and inbox Black people about how angry you are, say it in your own social media platform, and when your racist friends come out against you call them out.
- 13. Train yourself to be OK with being uncomfortable. Ask yourself "What is the next brave and right thing to do? Not the next 50 years...the next brave move."
- 14. Unenroll your kids from high-priced privatized or parochial schools and put them in failing public schools with Black kids. The point is to think about what is happening in your mind, body, and

spirit when you read this suggestion. Allow your eyes to open up to the truth of systemic oppression in our school system.

- 15. Acknowledged your white (light-skin) privilege and use it as leverage to open doors for Black people.
- 16. Be willing to speak truth in love to power and let your donors board members or supporters be mad and take their money with them. God will provide in a new way.
- 17. Go to local chapters or meetings by such agencies and groups to put your own time and body on the line.
- 18. Actively, organically, be open to real, life-changing friendships with those you consider "other". And keep the relationship ongoing (don't just do a one-time encounter). For those of you who are already as active as you can be, who else are you taking on your journey? Who can you encourage to get involved?

LIVING OUT JESUS' SERVICE IN COMMUNITY

When well-meaning Christians—whether White, Non-Black, or even Black individuals who feel culturally dissociated—seek to understand liberation in spiritual formation, they are stepping into the sacred work of drawing all humanity into the reality and union of God. Through the lens of African American spirituality and the life of Jesus, we are invited to embody love, justice, and compassion. Reggie Williams' *Dietrich Bonhoeffer's Black Jesus* guides us in this journey, gently calling us to see and stand with the marginalized while recognizing the deep injustices in our world (Matthew 5-7, Sermon on the Mount). Let us reflect on how Christ's love and justice transform us to live in deeper union with God and each other.

Walking with the Homeless

Imagine joining a local outreach group that serves meals to people experiencing homelessness. Instead of just dropping off food, you sit with them, learn their stories, and help connect them with housing or employment services. This is a real example of walking alongside the marginalized rather than providing a one-time handout.

Supporting Immigrant Families

Think of an immigrant family in your neighborhood who struggles with navigating a new culture and language. Standing with them might look like helping them fill out important paperwork, teaching English, or simply being a consistent, supportive friend as they adjust to life in a new country.

Advocating for Racial Justice

Picture someone attending city council meetings or participating in peaceful protests, advocating for policy changes that directly impact people of color, like police reform or housing equity. By taking an active stance, this person not only empathizes with those suffering injustice but works to dismantle the systems of oppression.

💥 Economic Support for the Poor

A community member could start or volunteer at a financial literacy program for low-income families, providing tools and education to break the cycle of poverty. This goes beyond charity, offering empowerment and long-term support to those often overlooked by mainstream financial systems.

Joining Refugee Resettlement Efforts

Think of volunteering with organizations that help refugees. It could mean picking them up from the airport, furnishing their new apartment, or helping them integrate into their new community by connecting them with schools, jobs, and social services.

Inclusive Hiring Practices

As a hiring manager or colleague, you can advocate for more diverse hiring practices by ensuring job postings reach underrepresented communities. You could push for blind resumes to eliminate bias or support mentorship programs for employees from marginalized groups.

K Challenging Pay Disparities

If you notice pay inequities in your workplace—especially along lines of race, gender, or other marginalized identities—speak up and push for transparent pay audits. Advocate for equal pay for equal work and support initiatives that address the wage gap.

Supplier Diversity

If you're in procurement or have a say in which vendors the company uses, ensure that you're supporting underrepresented-owned, women-owned, or socially responsible businesses. This redirects resources to historically marginalized communities and promotes equity.

Addressing Microaggressions

If you witness a colleague making a comment or joke that perpetuates stereotypes, don't stay silent. Gently but firmly address the issue by explaining why the comment is harmful, fostering an environment of respect and inclusion.

Promoting Anti-Racism Training

Encourage your organization to invest in anti-racism or bias awareness training for all employees. This raises awareness about systemic racism and equips employees with tools to create a more equitable workplace culture.

Voting for Justice-Oriented Policies

When election season comes around, research candidates and policies that prioritize dismantling systems of racism, inequality, and economic exploitation. Voting for representatives who support racial justice reforms, fair housing, and criminal justice reform is a key way to take action.

Supporting Local Justice Movements

Get involved with grassroots organizations that fight for local issues like police reform, affordable housing, or healthcare access. Even if you don't lead the charge, showing up to meetings, donating, or advocating in your community amplifies the cause.

Writing to Representatives

Engage your political representatives by writing letters or emails urging them to address racial injustice, economic inequality, or other systemic issues. Your voice can influence policy decisions on issues such as fair wages, voting rights, and equitable access to education.

Boycotting Unethical Companies

Be mindful of where you spend your money. Support businesses that pay fair wages, prioritize sustainable practices, and treat workers—especially those from marginalized backgrounds—fairly. Boycott companies with exploitative labor practices or poor records on racial justice.

Engaging in Policy Reform at School

If you're involved in local school boards or PTA meetings, advocate for policies that address educational disparities, such as better funding for under-resourced schools or equitable disciplinary practices that reduce the school-to-prison pipeline.

Discussing Racism with Kids

Have open conversations with your children about racism, inequality, and justice. Use age-appropriate books, movies, or news events to teach them about the history and ongoing impact of systemic racism, encouraging empathy and action.

Modeling Inclusive Language and Behavior

Be intentional about how your family speaks about people from different backgrounds. Model respect and inclusivity in conversations at home by avoiding stereotypes, and teach your children to do the same. Show them how to challenge unfair language or actions when they encounter it at school or in social settings.

Support Diverse Media and Products

Make it a habit to expose your family to books, movies, and music created by people from diverse backgrounds. Celebrate the richness of different cultures and perspectives through your family's entertainment choices. This helps to counteract media that often excludes or misrepresents marginalized voices.

X Volunteering Together

Get involved in local community service projects as a family that supports marginalized groups. You can volunteer at shelters, food banks, or local initiatives that address racial or economic disparities. This not only helps your community but instills values of justice and service in your children.

Supporting Underrepresented-Owned Businesses

Make a family decision to regularly buy from underrepresented businesses in your area. When shopping for food, clothes, or services, intentionally seek out businesses run by people from marginalized communities, teaching your children the importance of economic justice.

Attend Community Events

Participate in local events or peaceful protests that focus on justice issues, such as racial equity or immigrant rights. This can be a powerful experience for children to see their family standing up for what is right, helping them understand that change happens when communities unite.



Encouraging Civic Engagement

If your children are old enough, encourage them to get involved in activism, such as writing letters to representatives or participating in youth groups that focus on social justice. You can also model civic responsibility by taking your children with you when you vote and explaining why voting for policies that address systemic oppression matters.

Praying for Justice Together

Incorporate prayers for justice, equity, and compassion into your family's spiritual practices. Pray specifically for those who are suffering due to systemic racism, poverty, or oppression, and for the wisdom and courage to be agents of change.

Living Out Faith Values

Encourage your family to live out the values of mercy, justice, and love in practical ways, drawing from biblical principles. This might include acts of kindness toward marginalized neighbors, advocating for fair treatment at school or work, or standing up for someone being mistreated.

Partnering with Justice-Focused Ministries

As a family, partner with churches or ministries that focus on justice and serving the marginalized. Whether through mission trips, local outreach, or financial support, involve your children in faithdriven work that fights systemic oppression.

Family Justice Projects

As a family, create a "justice project" where you focus on one area of oppression each month, such as hunger, homelessness, or immigration. Together, research the issue, pray about it, and find ways to help, whether by volunteering, donating, or raising awareness in your community.

Encouraging Open Dialogue

Create a home environment where family members feel safe discussing injustice they witness or experience. Whether it's bullying at school, racial bias, or unfair treatment, encourage your children to share their feelings and help them think through ways they can stand up for what's right.

Spiritual Freedom Conversations

Engage in family devotionals where you explore what it means to be free—physically, emotionally, and spiritually. Discuss how Jesus' mission of liberation from Luke 4:18 can be lived out in your lives, whether through freeing others from injustice or finding spiritual freedom from fear, anxiety, or harmful behaviors.

Liberation through Service

As a family, serve those in bondage to poverty or oppression in your community. This could look like working with organizations that support formerly incarcerated individuals, helping them reintegrate into society, or advocating for fair wages for marginalized workers.

Hosting Justice Conversations with Neighbors

Invite neighbors and friends over to discuss justice and mercy as central to faith. You could share scriptures like Micah 6:8 and Luke 4:18 and brainstorm together how your community can help address local injustices, such as food insecurity or racial discrimination.

Participating in Freedom-Focused Events

Join family-friendly events like community forums, protests, or social justice festivals that promote freedom for the oppressed. These could focus on racial equality, immigrant rights, or economic justice. As a family, participate in activities that allow your children to witness and experience what liberation in action looks like.

Justice and Mercy in Prayer

Incorporate Micah 6:8 and Luke 4:18 into your family's prayer life. Pray specifically for those in your community and around the world who are oppressed, asking for God's guidance in how your family can be part of the solution. Pray for courage to live out a faith that prioritizes justice and mercy in daily actions.

Supporting Freedom Ministries

Partner with or financially support ministries that work toward liberating people from modern forms of bondage—whether through anti-human trafficking efforts, prison ministry, or supporting refugees. Involve your children in learning about these ministries and discuss why this work reflects Jesus' heart for liberation.

Liberation in Spiritual Formation

As part of your family's spiritual growth, reflect on how Jesus' mission to free the oppressed (Luke 4:18) impacts your daily faith. Discuss how liberation from fear, shame, or harmful cycles is not just social but spiritual. Encourage each family member to seek personal freedom in Christ and help others do the same by standing against systems of injustice.
